It used to be that getting to St. Vincent and the 32 smaller islands that make up the Grenadines meant a full day of travel. But the payoff was always well worth the effort, for with the trek to the southern-most Caribbean islands came the reward of empty beaches and glimpses of true island life unimpeded by crowds.

Last year fewer than 16,000 Americans visited St. Vincent, while a whopping 790,000 jetted to Jamaica. This all may be about to change thanks to a hefty initiative by Harlequin Resorts. What once meant lengthy layovers and logistical planning is now made easy with a simple booking.
